

Ira F. Stanphill was born in Belview, New Mexico, in 1914. He has written more than 550 songs, the most popular of which are "Mansion over the Hilltop," "Room at the Cross," and, of course, "Happiness Is the Lord."

On any number of occasions the Lord has given a song to a songwriter when he or she least expected it. Such was the case of Ira Stanphill one afternoon in 1974 after he left the church office where he was pastor in Fort Worth, Texas. The car radio was on, and as he rode along he listened to some commercial programs. Some were sponsored by establishments

that advertised their happy hour and their alcoholic beverages. He also heard cigarettes being advertised in terms of how they bring happiness. The word happiness was used several times in the ads. Ira related to me that he thought at the time that happiness does not come with these things, but with knowing Christ. He continued, As this thought really took over my mind I began to sing. I sang a new song, composing words and melody as I drove along. I sang it almost as it is published today. —Lindsay Terry

UMCOR: United Methodist Committee on Relief



Fill the truck at Annual Conference! A semi will be there June 10-11 to accept donations.

Needed Items: Treadle sewing machines, cloth diapers, receiving blankets, and any of the UMCOR kits listed online: bedding kits, sewing kits, school kits, birthing kits, cleaning buckets, health kits and more.

HOW TO PACKAGE AND LABEL KITS: PLEASE, no sacks! More than 3-4 kits or 7-8 bulk items should be in labeled boxes, not bags. Mark each box, or print a summary list and tape to the outside, telling of contents of each box. Partially filled boxes (not sealed) are welcome so single kits from other churches can be added.

HOW TO HANDLE THE MONEY: For each kit, UMCOR asks for a one dollar donation to assist in shipping to places of need, or approx. \$15-\$20 for boxes of bulk materials. Do not put cash in a kit or box, but convert to check, payable to MMDC.

Tornados Hit Baxter Springs,

KS: In less than two weeks much has been accomplished in Baxter Springs, KS following the April 27 tornado. Damage to homes and businesses was significant, leaving behind a wake of debris and chaos. The Relief Phase of this disaster is quickly ramping down with destroyed

homes being demolished, debris hauled off, roofs tarped, and people finding temporary places to live.

UMC Volunteers have been wonderful and have helped meet with survivors to learn about their needs at the Multiple Agency Resource Center held in the high school, hand out UM-COR blankets, bedding kits, health kits, school and layette kits, tarps and gift cards, plus help with setting up an office, finding furniture, bringing in the shower and tool trailers, and debris clean-up in the community.

Plans are now underway for the long-term recovery phase, a time when case management is done to help survivors find the needed funds to repair and rebuild their homes. On May 6th, Rev. Wayne Handle, pastor of Baxter Springs First United Methodist Church, and other leaders organized an initial meeting at the church to discuss the need for leaders in the Baxter Springs community to form a long-term recovery committee. This group will become a coalition of churches, nonprofits, businesses, and civic organizations, to coordinate benefits and

volunteers to help survivors.

As Great Plains United Methodists, we will be a part of that coalition and will continue to share in the leadership, providing spiritual and emotional care, financial support, and volunteers who will help rebuild and repair.

Tornadoes hit south central Nebraska: Beaver Crossing, a town of about 550-600 people, has major damage. The Nebraska Emergency Service coordinator said just about every house in town is damaged to some degree, though they are still trying to come up with numbers. Pastor Tamara Holtz reported the United Methodist Church and the parsonage received extensive damage. The church basement sheltered about 20 people during the storm.

The best thing United Methodists can do for this community is to contribute to the Great Plains Disaster Relief Fund. United Methodists wanting to help can do so through your local church offering plate to the conference disaster response fund, with the number 975 in the memo line, or donate online.

Funds are used to help in times of disaster across the Great Plains Conference.

Bishop's Bike Challenge



Bishop's Bicycle Challenge

The Bishop's Bicycle Challenge began in 2010 under the leadership of Scott Jones, bishop of the Great Plains United Methodist Conference. All funds raised went to support the Wichita Open Door capital campaign for buildings and facilities. To date \$100,000 has been raised! The ride is now headed for its fifth successful year in 2014 on Sat., June 21.

The Bishop's Bicycle Challenge is open to all interested cyclists and offers three different rides: 20-mile ride, 50K ride and a 100K ride. Check-in and final registration for the 2014 Ride starts at 6 a.m. on June 21. Official start time is 7 a.m. However

later starts are welcome until 8 a.m.

All rides start and finish at Andover United Methodist Church, 1429 N. Andover Road, in Andover, KS.

All funds raised through the 2014 Bishop's Bicycle Challenge will support Open Door, which will in turn allow the agency to provide much needed services for years to come. Open Door assists more than 38,000 unduplicated people in need each year.

Open Door Volunteer Opportunities

Community Food Ministry: 8:50 AM - 12 NOON 1:00 PM - 4:00 PM

Distribution Assistant: Carry out food boxes for clients. Must be able to lift 30-pound boxes. Closed toe shoes are required.

File Room Worker: Retrieve files as clients are being served at the Community Food Ministry, perform routine clerical tasks. Must be able to be on their feet during most of their shift and be able to bend and stoop to reach files.

Front Desk Receptionist: Greet and welcome clients coming to the Community Food Ministry for assistance. Furnish applications to clients and do a cursory check of required information. Interact with Intake Workers and File Room Workers

Intake Worker: Interview lowincome people applying for assistance at the Community Food Ministry. Need to be comfortable working with people from a wide variety of backgrounds. They must be flexible and compassionate but also assertive. This is an excellent training opportunity for a student majoring in sociology, psychology, social work or similar discipline.

Grocery Sacker: Sack groceries at the Community Food Ministry. Must be able to stand during the three-hour shift and able to lift 30-35 pounds. Must wear closed-toe shoes.

Telephone Receptionist: Answer telephones; provide callers with information about Open Door programs, documentations and eligibility requirements for the Community Food Ministry

program.

Community Supplemental Food Program: Monday – Friday 8:50am – 12pm & 1pm-4pm. Assemble food boxes to be distributed and/or delivered to seniors (60+).

Klothes Kloset: Monday, Wednesday, Friday, 10am-12pm, 12pm-2pm Sort, hang up clothes, and assist clients with shopping.

Homeless Resource Center: Monday – Friday, 11:30am-1pm. Prepare and serve 100 meals.
